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GARDEN CLUB

Ho-Hum winter blues set in this month after all the holiday activity has passed. However, as gardeners we can overcome that a bit simply by concentrating on what is coming.

January is a month of new beginnings for us all. What to expect: New plantings for the back wall of the clubhouse, and when the pool is completed, a butterfly garden to help sustain the pollinator population. We also have a few other ideas under consideration.

Although winter limits our outdoor garden activities there are a few gentle tasks to accomplish while waiting to get growing again. Get outside! Even in the cold it is beneficial and uplifting.

Give your birds a drink. Birds that spend the winter in our area need water as well as food. Invest in a heated birdbath and be sure to keep it filled. Or use a sturdy, weatherproof container, such as a heavy-duty plastic saucer. Dump out the ice each morning and replace it with warm water to keep your feathered friends well hydrated.

Watch for frost heave. Repeated periods of freezing and thawing cause soil to shift and can damage shallow or delicate roots, even pushing them above ground level and exposing them to colder temperatures and drying sun and wind. If there's no snow cover, walk around once a week or so to check on fall-planted perennials (woodies, in particular) and cover any exposed roots with mulch until you can reset the root ball properly in the spring.

Go on pest patrol. While you're outside, check for spotted lantern fly egg masses. Look for the putty-colored splotches on tree trunks, fences, trellises, garden furniture, pots, rocks, wheelbarrows, and other equipment that stays outdoors. Take a close look at the outside of your house and storage containers too. Smash any masses that you find or scrape them into a container of rubbing alcohol or hand sanitizer and then seal it and discard it.

Treat your tools to a spa day. January is a great time to give all your gardening tools some attention. I promise you'll feel it was worth an hour or two of your time when you have clean, sharp tools ready to use in spring! Clean off any clinging soil, remove rust spots on metal parts, and sharpen the blades of pruning and digging tools. Protect all metal parts with a light coating of vegetable oil or a multipurpose spray lubricant and give wooden parts an appropriate protective coating too. Since you'll be handling your tools often, and probably around edible crops, it's a good idea to use a skin and food safe material to treat the handles. Check labels to find a product with these qualities, such as a Danish oil or butcher-block conditioner or try coconut oil if you have some on hand.

Get an early start on seeds. It's too soon to plant most seeds that need warmth to germinate, but it's a perfect time to sow perennials and woody plants that benefit from cold or alternating temperatures. Sowing in early January gives enough of a cold period for practically all seeds that need one, such as blazing stars (Liatris) and the freezing-and-thawing periods common during our winters benefit seeds with tough seed coats. Sow in pots, and then set them in an unheated shed or outdoors in a spot where they will be protected from mice. (An old fish tank or plastic box with a screen on top works well.) Water the pots occasionally if the weather has been dry for a while or if they're not exposed to rain and snow; make sure they're not sitting in water, though.

Looking forward to our first meeting of 2024 on March 13th. The Garden Club meets the second Wednesday of the month at 10:30 a.m. in the Lion's Den and we would be most happy to have you join us.

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Architectural Regulations Revisions

Please Tear out and Place in the Lions Head South By-Laws **Architectural Regulations**

Page 1, II. Restrictions on Common Property Uses. Page 14, XV. Exterior Storage of Trash or Supplies

Recommendations presented by the Architectural Committee to include additions/revisions to Restrictions on Common Property Uses and Exterior Storage of Trash or Supplies.

Motion approved by the Board of Trustees August 28, 2023.

PLEASE NOTE ADDITIONAL REVISION TO PAGE 1, II. RESTRICTIONS ON COMMON GROUND, PARAGRAGH 7 TO READ AS FOLLOWS:

Vegetable gardens shall be limited to the three-foot wide rear foundation planting area of the house or side from the rear of the air conditioning unit to the rear of the house or an equivalent area on the opposite side of the house. Tree plantings may be protected with green vinyl coated landscaping type fencing, specifically designed to protect plants. It may be placed around new plantings, during their first year of planting. It may not exceed three (3) feet in height and must be removed by May 1 of the year following the planting. No chicken wire or construction fencing may be used.

Lions Head South Architectural Regulations Page 14, XV. Exterior Storage Deck Box and Upright Garden/Storage Container. Replaces 2nd Paragraph.

One (1) small deck box, no larger than six (6) feet in length, thirty-six (36) inches in height and thirty-six (36) inches deep, with a top hinged lid only, may be placed behind the air conditioner on either side of the house, but not on the street side if a corner property. It may also be placed on the rear patio at the rear of the house. In addition, one (1) upright storage/garden container, measuring no larger than six (6) feet in height, three (3) feet wide and two (2) feet deep may be stored on the rear patio. A maximum of two (2) units (one of each) maybe placed on each property. The storage units may not be made of wood and must be constructed of man-made materials. It must be stand-alone and may not be attached to the house. The color must blend in with the existing color of the house. Prior approval of the size, color and location of the storage unit (s) is required by the Architectural Committee.

Lions Head South Association 2024 Budget Information & HOA Increase

ATTENTION HOMEOWNERS:

In the 2023 December edition of the Pride (which was distributed November 27th) the proposed 2024 Operating Budget and the Capital Improvement Budget were presented for all to review. Subsequently, as notified, a Resident's meeting was held on December 4, 2023, where a comprehensive review and explanation of the 2024 Budget was presented.

For those homeowners who did not attend this important meeting, here is a brief review:

After Administrative and Standing Committees have submitted their recommendations to the Finance Committee, the Finance Committee reviews all recommendations and justifications. They are then compared to proposed income for the year (2023). Also reviewed are the long-term engineering reports which look at Capital Replacement items of concern. Capital Replacement items are one-time expenses not associated with the Operating Budget, which covers day-to-day expenses to operate the community.

The Finance Committee working with the Board of Trustees; the Administration and Association accountants will review all of these items. Also considered is the Consumer Price Index (CPI) published by the Federal Government. This is a percentage that represents the increase in the cost of goods and services for all of us. As explained at the meeting, we have only increased our HOA's \$15.00 in the last ten years. Considering all of the information available to us as described above, the prudent thing to assure that we are able to maintain our community at its present level is to increase the HOA fee to \$165.00/month for the year 2024, still remaining one of the lowest in the area.

According to the account, the \$25.00 HOA increase will cover the current Capital Replacement Expense shortfall.

Also, for those having HOA fees deducted from their bank accounts; please notify your financial institutions of the increase. Any late payment penalties for January 2024 will be waived.

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As we approach another winter season, we again find it necessary to clarify who qualifies for the Priority Snow Removal list for 2023-2024 winter season. A new request is required every season.

For those who qualify, please submit your request to assure that you will be placed on the priority list. To qualify, a resident must require regular life-sustaining medical treatment, such as chemotherapy, radiation or dialysis in or outside the home.

A "heart condition" does not qualify. Your request must be accompanied by a **physician script/note** which specifies that life-sustaining treatment for any of the conditions outlined above is necessary. Hand written notes are unacceptable. All information will be kept by the administrator and will be confidential.

For convenience purposes, your doctor may fax this information to our office. Our fax number is 732-920-2650. Please be assured this information will be kept strictly confidential. Placement on the Priority Snow List cannot be accomplished until we receive the necessary documentation from your physician.

Your need to go to work does not qualify for priority snow removal. For this purpose, we suggest you make advance arrangements with a private contractor for snow removal. The township will cooperate by plowing our roads so that our contractor can begin work. Of course, the town will continue to respond to any serious problems during storms.

ALWAYS CALL 911 FOR ANY MEDICAL EMERGENCY

Please be sure to keep on hand extra supplies of medications and food so that you do not need to leave the house during or immediately after a snowstorm. The weather predications generally provide ample warning time for making preparations.

For convenience purposes, your doctor may fax this information to our office. Our fax number is 732-920-2650. Please be assured this information will be kept strictly confidential. Placement on the Priority Snow List cannot be accomplished until we receive the necessary documentation from your physician.

Please respond as soon as possible as the winter season will be here soon.



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
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
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
