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

GARDEN CLUB

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This time of year is slowdown time for the Garden Club. November is our last meeting of the year, and our final chore is holiday decorating immediately after Thanksgiving. I must commend our members for their dedication, innovation and the tireless work exhibited by each and every one of them. They are a fine group indeed!

Now, in November, our area is deeper into fall and nature is winding down. However, there are still things to do in the garden. From planting those bulbs you still have in the garage to decorating for the holidays, November can be surprisingly busy with:

- Winterizing your hoses
- Add organic matter to the garden
- Bring in garden tools for the winter. Clean, sharpen and oil them first
- Keep removing weeds
- Keep watering until the ground freezes
- In Zone 7 (that's us) plant spring bulbs

The Farmers' Almanac predicts: "Snowfall will be above normal across most snow-prone areas." So....

- Wrap young evergreens in burlap to protect from the extreme winter.
- Apply protective mulches on the perennial garden after the ground has frozen an inch or two.
-Cover empty beds with straw or shredded leaves to keep weeds from growing.
-Scrub and disinfect flowerpots from debris, soaking with mild bleach-water solution and rinsing.
-Add mulch to flower and bulb beds after the ground freezes to help prevent winter damage.
-Give all trees and shrubs plenty of water before the ground freezes.
-To protect tender perennials from harsh winter weather, place a wooden frame around plants after the ground has frozen and fill with leaves.
-Bring in garden furniture or cover if you have not already done so.

Phew! A lot of work!

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THE RECIPE BOX

NOVEMBER - MONTH #11 ... & THE BEGIN-NING OF THE HOLIDAY SEASON!

It's been noted that Thanksgiving Day has the most food on the dinner table! AND, always the most leftovers.

Using WAFFLES, the leftovers can be turned into quick, easy & yummy dinners!

Touching on some WAFFLE HISTORY:

Late in the 14th/15th century, Ancient Greeks made a cake called OBLEIOS, meaning ... cooked between 2 hot metal plates. Sometime in the 15th century, the Dutch developed rectangular plates with grids much like the iron's of today. In Mid 19th century, waffles became an attractive party favorite.

THE BASIC WAFFLE RECIPE ... flour, milk or water, eggs. The batter can be enhanced with spices such as cinnamon, ginger, vanilla ... AND sometimes butter, honey or cream can make their way into the mix.

Suggestions for the November BOX were provided by friends & family of LHS!

Waffle Stuffing Batter

Ingredients:

3 - 4 cups of leftover stuffing

2 large eggs

1/4 - 1/2 cup of chicken broth

Directions:

- 1. Preheat waffle maker & grease with a spray for non-stick.
- 2. In a large bowl stir leftover stuffing, 2 eggs & 1/4 cup of chicken broth (add more broth as needed to keep mixture moist).
- 3. Place a large spoon of the mixture onto the preheated waffle machine to cover the base completely. (the stuffing mixture will not spread) cook until golden brown & crispy.
- 4. Repeat until all the mixture is used. Should make approximately 3-4 waffles.

Sweet Potato Waffle Batter - GLUTEN FREE Ingredients:

2 - 3 mashed Sweet Potatoes - LEFT OVER POTATOES

dry Ingredients:

2 cups rolled oats

2 tsp. baking powder

1/2 tsp salt

1 tsp cinnamon

1/2 tsp nutmeg

1/4 tsp ground ginger

wet ingredients

1 1/4 cups of buttermilk

2 eggs

1 tsp vanilla extract

Directions:

STEP 1. In a blender, place all dry ingredients & blend well until oats are broken down. When complete place in a bowl & set aside.

STEP 2. In blender, place all wet ingredients & mashed sweet potatoes. Blend well.

STEP 3. ADD 1/2 dry ingredients to the (wet) in blender. REPEAT & complete ... until all blended together well.

STEP 4. Preheat & grease waffle maker. Pour 1/2 cup of batter into machine & cook until golden.

****** Both waffles can be served with Sliced Turkey & gravy, Creamed Turkey, butter, syrup or topping of choice.... with cranberry sauce on the side.

Pumpkin Swirl Cream Cheese Muffins Ingredients:

2 lg eggs

1/2 cup vegetable oil

15 ozs. pumpkin puree

1 cup granulated sugar

1 3/4 cup all-purpose flour

2 tsp pumpkin spice

1/2 tsp vanilla extract

1 tsp baking soda

1/2 tsp Kosher salt

8 ozs. cream cheese

1/2 cup confectioners' sugar (10X)

OPTIONAL add ins ... 1/2 cup cranberries, 1/2 cup chopped walnuts

Directions:

- 1. Preheat oven to 375* spray muffin tin.
- 2. In a lg. bowl beat eggs, veggie oil, vanilla extract, pumkpin puree, granulated sugar.
- 3. ADD to bowl > flour, pumpkin spice, baking soda & salt .. stir with spatula until combined. If any OPTIONS are chosen.. add in at this point.
 - 4. Fill each muffin cup 3/4 with mixture.
- 5. In a large bowl, beat cream cheese until smooth... adding 10X sugar.
- 6. Top each muffin with 1 tbsp of cream cheese mixture, use toothpick to swirl.
- 7. Bake 18 20 mins. insert toothpick to check for completed baking. Ok if a bit of cake shows on the toothpick. Baking completed.

Architectural Regulations Revisions

Please Tear out and Place in the Lions Head South By-Laws **Architectural Regulations**

Page 1, II. Restrictions on Common Property Uses. Page 14, XV. Exterior Storage of Trash or Supplies

Recommendations presented by the Architectural Committee to include additions/revisions to Restrictions on Common Property Uses and Exterior Storage of Trash or Supplies.

Motion approved by the Board of Trustees August 28, 2023.

PLEASE NOTE ADDITIONAL REVISION TO PAGE 1, II. RESTRICTIONS ON COMMON GROUND, PARAGRAGH 7 TO READ AS FOLLOWS:

Vegetable gardens shall be limited to the three-foot wide rear foundation planting area of the house or side from the rear of the air conditioning unit to the rear of the house or an equivalent area on the opposite side of the house. Tree plantings may be protected with green vinyl coated landscaping type fencing, specifically designed to protect plants. It may be placed around new plantings, during their first year of planting. It may not exceed three (3) feet in height and must be removed by May 1 of the year following the planting. No chicken wire or construction fencing may be used.

Lions Head South Architectural Regulations Page 14, XV. Exterior Storage Deck Box and Upright Garden/Storage Container. Replaces 2nd Paragraph.

One (1) small deck box, no larger than six (6) feet in length, thirty-six (36) inches in height and thirty-six (36) inches deep, with a top hinged lid only, may be placed behind the air conditioner on either side of the house, but not on the street side if a corner property. It may also be placed on the rear patio at the rear of the house. In addition, one (1) upright storage/garden container, measuring no larger than six (6) feet in height, three (3) feet wide and two (2) feet deep may be stored on the rear patio. A maximum of two (2) units (one of each) maybe placed on each property. The storage units may not be made of wood and must be constructed of man-made materials. It must be stand-alone and may not be attached to the house. The color must blend in with the existing color of the house. Prior approval of the size, color and location of the storage unit (s) is required by the Architectural Committee.

PRIORITY FOR DRIVEWAY SNOW REMOVAL

As we approach another winter season, we again find it necessary to clarify who qualifies for the Priority Snow Removal list for 2023-2024 winter season. A new request is required every season.

For those who qualify, please submit your request to assure that you will be placed on the priority list. To qualify, a resident must require regular life-sustaining medical treatment, such as chemotherapy, radiation, or dialysis in or outside the home.

A "heart condition" does not qualify. Your request must be accompanied by a physician script/note which specifies that life-sustaining treatment for any of the conditions outlined above is necessary. Hand written notes are unacceptable. All information will be kept by the administrator and will be confidential.

For convenience purposes, your doctor may fax this information to our office. Our fax number is 732-920-2650. Please be assured this information will be kept strictly confidential. Placement on the Priority Snow List cannot be accomplished until we receive the necessary documentation from your physician.

Your need to go to work does not qualify for priority snow removal. For this purpose, we suggest you make advance arrangements with a private contractor for snow removal.

The township will cooperate by plowing our roads so that our contractor can begin work. Of course, the town will continue to respond to any serious problems during storms.

ALWAYS CALL 911 FOR ANY MEDICAL EMERGENCY

Please be sure to keep on hand extra supplies of medications and food so that you do not need to leave the house during or immediately after a snowstorm. The weather predications generally provide ample warning time for making preparations.

Please respond as soon as possible as the winter season will be here soon.





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
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
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
