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
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GARDEN CLUB

All of the summer plantings were completed by the end of May and after a month of growth the flower beds and pots are in full bloom. The dedicated members of the Garden Club will continue to water and maintain these throughout the heat of summer to preserve their splendor.

A welcome break was a luncheon at Carrabba's after our June meeting so that we could celebrate our undertakings and socialize for a change.

Here are some suggestions for the extra attention that should be given to your gardens in the month of July.

- Do not neglect your watering. When there is less than an inch of rain in a week, water extra, early in the morning at the roots, not the foliage.
- Trees and shrubs need deep watering every 10-14 days to a depth of 3 inches with a hose at the roots. Do not fertilize.
- Feed your roses mid-month to encourage more flowering.
- Snip off the old flower clusters from rambler roses to encourage more blooms.
- Finish pruning spring-flowering shrubs by mid-month.
- Remove spent flowers from annuals to ensure continued blooming.
- Remove dead flowers from perennials to encourage new growth.
- Weed, weed, weed. Use mulch in flower beds to prevent them from sprouting.

From time-to-time I refer to the Old Farmer's Almanac for gardening tips and found a list of insect repelling plants you might be interested in.

Lavender, basil, thyme, lemon grass, alliums, chrysanthemum, petunias, marigolds, and mosquito plant.

RECREATION

The tennis/pickleball courts have been powerwashed and patched where needed. New pickleball lines have been drawn on the lone tennis court near the backboard to provide more play for pickleballers.

Did you know that pickleball is one of the fastest growing sports in our country? It is being taught and played in middle and high schools, and has become extremely popular in retirement communities and in recreational programs.

Feel free to stop by our courts when people are playing to observe and/or try your skills out. There is always someone willing to give a helping hand.

Here are some basic pickleball rules:

- 1. Each point begins with an underhand serve from behind the serving court.
- 2. Each point continues until a fault. The server serves into the opponent's diagonal court; he/she will rotate serving into each court as long as a point is awarded.
- 3. In doubles, each server will serve until there is a fault made by the serving team. Then a sideout occurs and the opposing team will serve. The only exception is the start of the game when only one server will serve.
- 4. You can't volley in the kitchen. The kitchen is the area from the net to the first line. You must wait till the ball bounces before stepping into the kitchen, and then must quickly get out.
- 5. The ball must bounce on both sides after a serve before either team can volley.
- 6. You only win points on your serve.
- 7. The served ball must land beyond the kitchen line and in diagonal court. All other lines are in bounds.
- 8. First team to 11 points wins, but you must win by 2.
- 9. Scoring is tricky. The server announces his/her score, followed by opponent's score, and then the number that corresponds to his serve (either server 1 or server 2)

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THE RECIPE BOX

The word of the month is POTPOURRI!, a noun of French origin meaning "a jar filled with spring/summer gatherings of herbs and flower pedals" giving a room the scent of a pleasant and fragment smell. Today in the English language, potpourri stands to mean "A MED-LEY", "AN ASSORTMENT", "A VARIETY"! Here is a collection of mixed timeless recipes from a friend who LOOOVES to cook simple!

Joey's Stuffed Artichoke Heart Pie

Ingredients:

1 med onion diced

2 tbsp butter

2 cans of artichoke hearts, drained, rinsed and split verti-

1 refrigerated pie crust (1 crust only)

4 eggs

1/4 cup fresh parsley chopped

1 clove of garlic, minced fine

1/2 cup grated Parmesan or Romano cheese

1/2 lb. of shredded mozzarella cheese

1/2 cup Italian bread crumbs

1/4 cup melted butter

1/4 tsp - ground black pepper

Salt to taste

Directions:

- 1. Preheat oven to 350°.
- 2. Line a pie plate with the pie crust and crimp the edge.
- 3. In a small saucepan, saute onions in 2 tbsp butter until soft and golden. Season with salt and pepper. Cool, then spread over pie crust.
- 4. Lay the artichoke halves on top of onions. Sprinkle with minced garlic.
- 5. In a medium bowl add eggs, parsley, grated cheese, 1/4 tsp black pepper and salt to taste ... whisk all together. Pour evenly over the artichokes.
- 6. Sprinkle mozzarella on top of the egg mixture (in pie crust).
- 7. In a saucepan, melt 1/4 cup of butter and combine with the breadcrumbs. Toss to form crumbs and sprinkle over the mozzarella cheese.
- 8. Pie is now ready to bake for 45 minutes, until eggs are cooked through. Let rest and serve!

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Joey's Savory Bread Pudding with Mushrooms and Leeks

Ingredients:

1 loaf of stale Italian bread or whole grain loaf

2 medium leeks

4 tbsp unsalted butter

1 (16 oz.) sliced baby bella mushrooms

4 eggs

1 tsp dried thyme

2 cups low fat milk

1 cup Gruyere or white cheese

1/4 cup chopped chives for garnish

Salt and pepper to season

Directions:

- 1. Preheat oven to 375°
- 2. Cut bread into 1" cubes (12 cups of cubes needed).
- 3. Cut leeks in half and rinse thoroughly (soak for 1/2hr). Using the light green and white parts (discarding the dark green parts), slice the halves thinly.
- 4. Clean mushrooms by wiping with a wet paper towel, removing any dirt.
- 5. In a large saucepan, melt the butter and add the mushrooms and leeks, stirring until leeks are tender. Add thyme and season with salt and pepper lightly. Remove from heat.
- 6. Spray a 3-qt baking dish with Pam and add bread and sauteed vegetables to toss.
- 7. In a medium bowl, whisk eggs, milk, cheese and chives. Season with salt and pepper lightly and pour mixture over baking dish. Gently press down into bread to soak the custard. Let sit for 10 mins.
- 8. Bake 40-50 mins. until fluffy and golden. Let cool slightly and serve. Garnish with more chives.

Joey's Simple Zucchini Flower Pancakes **Ingredients:**

8 - 10 zucchini flowers cleaned and cut into stripes (use a kitchen scissor to cut ... easy and no stick)

1 cup all purpose flour

2 1/2 tsp of baking powder

1/4 tsp salt

1/4 tsp black pepper

1/2 cup grated Locatelli grated cheese.

1 small clove garlic, (chopped fine)

1 tsp. parsley (chopped fine)

4 basil leaves (chopped fine)

4 eggs

Frying pan with approx. 1 cup Mazzola oil

Directions:

- 1. Mix all ingredients together.
- 3. Drop heaping tablespoons into heated oil and fry, turning once until golden brown on each side.
 - 4. Drain on paper towel.

Cakes can be kept in a heated oven for a FEW minutes before serving.

OPTION: A light marinara sauce can be served on the side!

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



BRICK SENIOR SHUTTLE: Provides no cost transportation Mon-Fri, 8 am-3 pm. Rides are first come, first served basis. A brief registration is required prior to using service. To schedule transportation call: 732-920-8686 between 9am & 11 am.



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2023 POOL RULES AND REGULATIONS

- NO LIFEGUARD ON DUTY Swim at your own risk.
- 2. All members/residents and guests must sign-in upon entrance to the pool area.
- 3. THUNDER AND LIGHTNING: When thunder occurs, all individuals must leave the pool area. The pool area will be reopened when conditions permit.
- 4. FOR SAFETY REASONS Pool furniture must be kept at least six (6) feet from the edge of the pool.
- Restrooms shall not be used as changing rooms. Dripping bathing suits and bare feet are not allowed in the clubhouse and restroom.
- Atalltimes members/residents and/or guests 16 or over must display numbered plastic badges for admission to the pool area.
- Children 15 or under must be accompanied and supervised by a responsible adult and must be signed in. No child aged 2-15 will be allowed in the pool between 1pm and 5pm except on Saturdays, when they are allowed in the pool from 12pm - 5pm. Children under the age of 2 are not allowed in the pool at any time. Diapers are not permitted at any age.
- Bathers must wear suitable bathing suits or swim wear. Cut-off pants or jeans are not permitted in the pool.
 - 9. Flotation objects, such as inflatable tubes, kickboards, and flippers, are not permitted in the pool. Styrofoam belts and arm "swimmies" will be permitted in the pool when an adult is in the pool with the child.
 - Diving is not permitted at any time.
 Jumping into the pool is permitted when standing on the edge. Lap lanes must be kept open for lap swimmers.

- 11. Bathers shall not sit on the stairs or ladders of the pool, FOR SAFETY REASONS.
- 12. Snacks, plastic bottles and cans are permitted inside the pool area and must be consumed at a table. NO GLASS OR ALCOHOL IS ALLOWED. Picnic tables are available outside the pool area for those having sandwiches, subs. pizza, etc.

A charcoal grill is available for your use outside the pool area. A fire shovel and ash can are also provided. Please clean up after use.

Garbage and recyclables must be disposed of in the receptacles that are provided outside of the pool entrance.

- 13. No sports, including ball playing or Horse play, will be permitted in the pool area. Children may have dive toys in the shallow end of the pool. Running is not permitted in the pool area. Loud music is not permitted.
- 14. Pets are not permitted in the pool area.
- 15. Smoking and "vaping" is permitted only at the end of the sidewalk in the parking area. Smoking and "vaping" is not permitted near the pool area or in any other sports area.
- 16. Chairs, tables and lounges are available to residents on first come basis. THEY MAY NOT BE RESERVED. Please bring chairs for your guests.
- 17. Upon exiting the pool area, please return chairs and lounges to their regular locations. Umbrellas are to be rolled down and tied.
- 18. Our pool maintenance company is Pool Operation Management.

Replacement Pages - Tear out and replace in Lions Head South Architectural Regulations - Page 3, VI. Application Procedures

Recommendation presented by the Architectural Committee to change required Application Procedures. Motion approved by the Board of Trustees May 8, 2023.

PLEASE NOTE REVISION TO PAGE 3, ARTICLE VI. APPLICATION PROCEDURES TO READ AS FOLLOWS:

Unit owners shall obtain one (1) application from the office and return it along with one (1) copy of a sketch (when required) to the office.

Applications shall include details such as the shape, total dimensions, location of the addition/alteration, and materials and colors to be used. The applicant shall sign and date copy.

All proposed additions/alterations shall be compatible with the architectural characteristics of the house, the neighborhood setting, color and construction details.

Applications shall be submitted no later than seven (7) business days before the monthly meeting. Action on applications is usually completed by the tenth of each month. Approved applications shall expire at the end of the calendar year submitted, after which a new application shall be required.

If an application is denied by the Architectural Committee, or if a unit owner disputes an Architectural Committee requirement, he/she may, via written appeal within thirty (30) days, seek a hearing before the Architectural Committee.

If, following the hearing, the Architectural Committee denies the appeal, the unit owner may, via a written appeal within thirty (30) days, seek a hearing before the Board of Trustees. Representatives of the Architectural Committee shall be present at this hearing. The decision of the Board of Trustees shall be final.

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
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
