

For those of you who were unable to attend the June 12th residents meeting here is the pool update:

We have a signed contract to go ahead with the new pool construction. Construction will begin shortly after Labor Day. The pool will have a beach entrance for those who may be a little unsteady on their feet; it will have a state-of-the-art, self-cleaning system. It should be ready for the 2024 pool season with a completion date of early May 2024. We have bank financing in place which will be repaid out of normal operating expenses; thus no increase in HOA fees or special assessments will be necessary. FYI we have allotted \$1.5 million dollars for its construction but do not anticipate it will cost that much.



Hope everyone is enjoying their summer at Lions Head. As we head into the middle of summer, with all the unexpected storms, please take time to walk around your home and check your siding, gutters and leaders to make sure they are intact. Also, check for fallen trees and tree limbs.

Please remember any alterations and changes to the exterior of your home need an Architectural Application. Applications are available at the office and on the website.

All tree branches overhanging the sidewalk must be pruned to a minimum of seven (7) feet up from the sidewalk. This is the homeowner's responsibility.

If there are plantings in front of your home around the utility boxes, they must be kept trimmed so the workers can have access to the boxes.

Per Architectural Regulations XIV Page 13

• Utility Box Planting

All shrubs planted around utility boxes shall be pruned at the sides and top of the cover so that the cover can be opened by utility company personnel. No shrubs or flowers shall be planted on the front side of the utility boxes. A10-foot clearance is needed in front of the transformer cover so that utility employees can properly service the transformer with special tools. No raised edging blocks, wall blocks or fences of any material shall be permitted around the utility box.

GARDEN CLUB

At this writing, we're having several dreary, cloudy, dismal days, almost like fall. It's the end of June, approaching July, and we should be having beautiful days of 80-90 degrees with bright sun. Oh, well, can't wait to see what August brings.

Hope you are all doing well with your milkweed plants and butterfly feeders. With all the beautiful summer flowers, you should be attracting many pollinators. (Would like to hear about your successes and/or failures.)

As previously mentioned, our plans for a butterfly/pollinator garden have been put on hold because of the upcoming pool construction. But we continue to search for areas that need attention. More on that in our upcoming articles.

It pleases me to know our articles are appreciated and members of the community feel comfortable calling and asking for information or advice. Recently, I heard from two members of our community. The first had a problem with groundhogs (woodchucks). She solved her problem before I had time to do much. But the following information may be helpful if you have a similar problem.

Groundhogs are active dawn to dusk, April through September. They like insects, worms and garden crops and will build their burrows under a structure's foundation or in wooded areas. Some solutions for discouraging them are:

- Fencing, if possible
- Predator urine—Who knew you can actually buy a jug of animal urine at your local home improvement store???
- Smelly stuff such as garlic, lavender, cayenne pepper, etc., spread throughout the yard
- Ammonia-soaked rags placed at or stuffed in the entrance of their burrow
- Scarecrow or vibrating things such as wind chimes or pinwheels
- If you have a serious problem, contact an exterminator or local animal control.

The second caller had a problem with rhododendron root weevils. Black vine weevils are the most obviously injurious insect pest of rhododendrons. It feeds on the roots and leaves of the rhododendron and other broadleaved evergreens. If your plant has leaves with circular notches on the edges, you have root weevils. The adults feed at night and are not seen in daylight. She had good luck with Neem Oil which is an organic natural inset killer.

- Following are some other do-it-your-self ways to rid your plant of this insect:
- Using a flashlight at night, find the weevils and remove and destroy them.

- Spread crumpled burlap or paper at the plant base, trapping the insect so they can be removed.
- Use plant friendly sticky tape around branches to prevent the insect from reaching the leaves, be sure to remove when no longer needed to prevent damage to the plant.
- There are pesticides that can be used against the larvae, and others that are effective on adults.

AUGUST GARDENING HINTS

It's time to divide Irises. With a knife, separate rhizomes, check for any borers and destroy them. Discard any soft or rotten rhizomes. Each rhizome division should have one leaf fan. Cut foliage back to 4-6 inches. Replant divisions 12-18 inches apart, with rhizome tops barely showing above the soil surface.

- Asters are a popular choice for late summer and fall color and are deer resistant.
- Late August and September is the time to separate and transplant peonies.
- It is a good time for final fertilizing of all plants.

We meet on the second Wednesday of each month from March through November at 10:30 AM in the Lion's Den. Our next meeting is August 9. Please join us and see if you'd like to be a part of this busy group.

LHS MEN'S CLUB



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

- NO LIFEGUARD ON DUTY Swim at your own risk.
- 2. All members/residents and guests must sign-in upon entrance to the pool area.
- 3. <u>THUNDER AND LIGHTNING</u>: When thunder occurs, all individuals must leave the pool area. The pool area will be reopened when conditions permit.
- FOR SAFETY REASONS Pool furniture must be kept at least six (6) feet from the edge of the pool.
- Restrooms shall not be used as changing rooms. Dripping bathing suits and bare feet are not allowed in the clubhouse and restroom.
- Atalltimes members/residents and/or guests 16 or over must display numbered plastic badges for admission to the pool area.
- Children 15 or under must be accompanied and supervised by a responsible adult and must be signed in. No child aged 2-15 will be allowed in the pool between 1pm and 5pm except on Saturdays, when they are allowed in the pool from 12pm – 5pm. Children under the age of 2 are not allowed in the pool at any time. Diapers are not permitted at any age.
 - Bathers must wear suitable bathing suits or swim wear. Cut-off pants or jeans are not permitted in the pool.
- Flotation objects, such as inflatable tubes, kickboards, and flippers, are not permitted in the pool. Styrofoam belts and arm "swimmies" will be permitted in the pool when an adult is in the pool with the child.
- Diving is not permitted at any time. Jumping into the pool is permitted when standing on the edge. Lap lanes must be kept open for lap swimmers.

- Bathers shall not sit on the stairs or ladders of the pool, FOR SAFETY REASONS.
- Snacks, plastic bottles and cans are permitted inside the pool area and must be consumed at a table. NO GLASS OR ALCOHOL IS ALLOWED. Picnic tables are available outside the pool area for those having sandwiches, subs, pizza, etc.

A charcoal grill is available for your use outside the pool area. A fire shovel and ash can are also provided. Please clean up after use.

Garbage and recyclables must be disposed of in the receptacles that are provided outside of the pool entrance.

- No sports, including ball playing or Horse play, will be permitted in the pool area. Children may have dive toys in the shallow end of the pool. Running is not permitted in the pool area. Loud music is not permitted.
- 14. Pets are not permitted in the pool area.
- 15. Smoking and "vaping" is permitted only at the end of the sidewalk in the parking area. Smoking and "vaping" is not permitted near the pool area or in any other sports area.
- Chairs, tables and lounges are available to residents on first come basis. THEY MAY NOT BE RESERVED. Please bring chairs for your guests.
- Upon exiting the pool area, please return chairs and lounges to their regular locations. Umbrellas are to be rolled down and tied.
