It's that time of year again — the doldrums of February. Even though it's cold outside right now, there are signs that spring will soon be here — the days are getting longer, songbirds are beginning to migrate, and the earliest bulbs will poke up out of the ground before you know it.

At our November meeting we thanked Clare Mathiasen for 7 years leading the Garden Club. Clare was instrumental in bringing us into the computer world with minutes and notices. She was responsible for the updating of several of our gardens and was always available to assist where needed. We welcomed our new chairperson, Diane Chapin, who is already very busy with plans for replacing the shrubs at the back wall of the Clubhouse and continuing the planning of our butterfly garden. Did you know that February 3rd is <u>"Feed the Birds</u> <u>Day"</u>? By late winter many natural food sources for local birds will begin to thin out. It's important to keep your bird feeders fully stocked until spring. Offer a variety of foods to attract the widest selection of bird species. Black oil sunflower seeds, for example, draw cardinals, blue jays, juncos, and a host of other species. Beef suet is ideal for woodpeckers, mockingbirds, and nuthatches, and Nyjer seed is a finch favorite. Also, include a diverse selection of feeders such as tube, hopper, and platform to accommodate the feeding habits of different bird species. During winter you can often attract more songbirds to fresh water than you can to food. Add fresh water every few days.

Another favorite holiday on February 14th is <u>Valen-tine's Day</u>. It's not only about love. . . it's about the beautiful rose. Rose cultivation dates back 5,000 years. Beginning in eastern Asia, it was used as perfume, party décor, and medicine. Most roses we see today can be traced back to the late 1700s. The flower's connection to Valentine's Day goes back to the 19th century when Victorians used floral bouquets to deliver a message to love interests. Red roses have stood the test of time across cultures, representing ideals of beauty, love, romance, and even politics.

While this flower is an expression of love all on its own, its color can convey different messages. The traditional red rose represents passion. The pink rose stands for appreciation and grace while the yellow conveys friendship and happiness. The white one implies innocence. Whatever you're trying to say to your loved one on Valentine's Day, the rose remains an ideal choice. It is estimated that 80 million roses are purchased for Valentine's Day. It's never too early to be reminded of the dilemma of the Monarch butterfly. Remember that milkweed plants are the only source of food for the Monarch caterpillar. But these plants are rapidly disappearing due to the loss of habitat stemming from land development and the widespread spraying of weed killer on the fields where they live. When planning your garden, remember to include the milkweed plant. If your seeds did not do well, several nurseries in the area have the plants for sale. We want to promote the recovery of the Monarch population now--one milkweed at a time. Also remember to plant colorful flowers to attract all pollinators to your garden.

February hints—worthy of repeating:

- Be careful using chemicals for icy pathways. Sand is a better replacement.
- Continue to inspect indoor plants for insects
- Start to fertilize houseplants on a regular basis with a water-soluble fertilizer
- Remove diseased or damaged limbs from trees and shrubs
- Bring Spring into your home a little early with branches of forsythia and pussy willow
- Most of all, be careful of icy walkways while walking outdoors

The Garden Club meets on the second Wednesday of each month, March through November. Our first meeting of the new year will be Wednesday, March 13, at 10:30 AM, in the Lion's Den. Hope to see you there.

FEBRUARY - the MONTH that celebrates CHOCO-LATE!

FRIENDS - An attachment with personal feelings. The word "FREOND" (English) means to love!

LOVE - So many forms of: could be > unconditional, platonic, romantic, self, guest or friendly!

CHOCOLATE - Some old friends love chocolate, and have shared some of their AMAZING and SPECIAL chocolate recipes!

THE PERFECT CHOCOLATINI -

It's NOT classic, but it's sophisticated! When friends gather it's time to share this very smooth, delicious & irresistible cocktail of the "MONTH"!

Ingredients:

3 OZ. BAILEY'S IRISH CREME 1 OZ. GREY GOOSE VODKA 2 OZ. GODIVA LIQUEUR 1 OZ. SHAVED CHOCOLATE

Directions:

1. Prepare a cocktail shaker (with strainer) 1/2 full of ice cubes

2. Add all ingredients & stir lightly to combined

3 Pour into CHILLED Martini glass & top with shaved chocolate

RIBEYE STEAK w/CHOCOLATE SAUCE - SURELY

NOT CLASSIC, but for the "LOVE OF STEAK" a surprisingly YUMMY savory sauce either "over" or "on the side" just a step to.. DRESS IT UP...!

Ingredients:

2 - Steaks of your choice

1 tbsp canola oil

kosher salt & ground black pepper

1 shallot finely chopped

7 oz of beef broth

1/2 tbsp of Worcestershire sauce

1/2 tbsp of flour (add water)

2 oz grated Semi sweet chocolate

1 tbsp COLD butter

1 tbsp of fresh chopped parsley (for garnish)

Directions:

1. Heat canola oil in a skillet large enough to stir the steak of your choice (med to high heat). Rib-eye works well with the recipe. Salt & pepper the steak sear each side for 3 minutes. Remove from pan & cover with foil.

2. In the same skillet, reduce heat to medium - add shallots & cook to soften, add broth, Worcestershire sauce & simmer.

3. Whisk flour with water, add to broth mixture, whisk until thickened.

4. Stir in chocolate & cold butter, adjust the salt & pepper to a personal taste.

5. Slice steak, place on serving plate. Pour sauce over top (or on the side). Garnish with sauteed mushrooms (if desired) & chopped parsley.

HOT CHOCOLATE COOKIES - Nothing better than to end a warm February evening! "LOVE of Hot Chocolate."

Ingredients:

12 tbsp. unsalted butter softened

1 1/2 cups granulated sugar

- 1/2 cup light brown sugar
- 4 large eggs
- 2 tsp vanilla extract

 $2 \frac{1}{2}$ all-purpose flour

1 cup cocoa powder

1 tsp salt

1/2 cup granulated sugar (for rolling)

1/4 cup marshmallows (cut in half)

CHOCOLATE GANACHE TOPPING - (after cookies are cooled)! Heat in microwave safe bowl for 25 seconds, stir and heat again for 25 seconds.

Ingredients:

1 cup chocolate chips

1/4 cup heavy cream

Directions:

1. Beat until fluffy > butter, granulated sugar & brown sugar.

2. Add eggs, vanilla extract & combine completely.

3. In a separate bowl, mix dry ingredients. Then gradually add to the wet ingredients & combine completely. Cover with plastic wrap & refrigerate 4 hours or chill overnight.

4. Preheat oven to 350° line several baking sheets with parchment paper.


5. Scoop 1 1/2 tbsp. of dough into balls & roll into (2nd) granulated sugar; bake for 10-12 minutes.

6. Remove from oven & immediately & carefully place 1/2 marshmallow into center, sticky side down. Cool for 25 mins. Drizzle Ganache over cooled cookies & allow to set.

PRIORITY FOR DRIVEWAY SNOW REMOVAL

As we approach another winter season, we again find it necessary to clarify who qualifies for the Priority Snow Removal list for 2023-2024 winter season. A new request is required every season.

For those who qualify, please submit your request to assure that you will be placed on the priority list. To qualify, a resident must require regular life-sustaining medical treatment, such as chemotherapy, radiation or dialysis in or outside the home.

A "heart condition" does not qualify. Your request must be accompanied by a **physician script/note** which specifies that life-sustaining treatment for any of the conditions outlined above is necessary. Hand written notes are unacceptable. All information will be kept by the administrator and will be confidential.

For convenience purposes, your doctor may fax this information to our office. Our fax number is 732-920-2650. Please be assured this information will be kept strictly confidential. Placement on the Priority Snow List cannot be accomplished until we receive the necessary documentation from your physician.

Your need to go to work does not qualify for priority snow removal. For this purpose, we suggest you make advance arrangements with a private contractor for snow removal. The township will cooperate by plowing our roads so that our contractor can begin work. Of course, the town will continue to respond to any serious problems during storms.

ALWAYS CALL 911 FOR ANY MEDICAL EMERGENCY

Please be sure to keep on hand extra supplies of medications and food so that you do not need to leave the house during or immediately after a snowstorm. The weather predications generally provide ample warning time for making preparations.

Please respond as soon as possible as the winter season will be here soon.



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




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
